Minutes of the Casitas Municipal Water District Board Meeting Held October 26, 2011

A meeting of the Board of Directors was held October 26, 2011 at Casitas' Office, Oak View, California. Directors Kaiser, Baggerly, Word, Hicks and Bergen were present. Also present were Steve Wickstrum, General Manager, Rebekah Vieira, Clerk of the Board, and Attorney, John Mathews. There was one staff member and four members of the public in attendance. President Kaiser led the group in the flag salute.

1. Public comments.

Richard Hajas thanked the board members for coming to the meeting on Monday night. I hope it gave a taste of what our community is dealing with and frustrations of water service and value for the money. I urge you to consider that you are more then a business and we are members of your district and we pay taxes to you. Together we can make Casitas a stronger organization.

Joe Conner with Baker Donaldson, representing Golden State, thanked the board members that were there on Monday night. If you need any additional info we are more than happy to provide it. We are more than willing to answer any questions you may have as this pursues.

2. General Manager comments.

Mr. Wickstrum provided a brief update on projects informing the board that the last filter project is in process and we are out to bid for the Rincon 2M replacement. The Upper Ojai pump plant is beginning with coordination with Edison and we hope to get that job done this fiscal year. Neil is going through the review of the reservoir tank cleaning and will assess the priority of the tanks.

There has been discussion with Jeff Pratt, Susan Mullins, Mike Solomon and Shawna Epstein regarding a short term lease on state water entitlement and if there are any avenues to get that water into this county. The team is looking at ways to get the water into the county first. The City of Ventura is interested in finding a lease rather than the turn back pool. We will participate in the turn back pool this year. The Ojai Chamber of Commerce mixer is being held tomorrow from 5:30 – 7:00 p.m. at Lake Casitas Recreation Area Picnic Area #1.

Board of Director comments.

Director Word reported that he attended the City of Ventura's rate setting workshop. The City of Ventura is faced with more complicated issues then we were with waste water rates and reclaimed water issues. There will be additional rates and they are concerned and this is the first time they have held public workshops. Director Word then requested moving the November Personnel Committee meeting to Tuesday, November 15th and moving the second board meeting to Tuesday November 22nd at 3:00 p.m.

BACKGROUND AND OVERVIEW:

The roof had deteriorated to a point beyond repair. This project consists of removal of the existing roof and installation of a new roof at Casitas #2 Chlorination building and painting of wood, exterior block and metal surfaces outside only. Three bids were solicited with Rayco Roofing being the lowest bidder. Rayco's bid is within FY 2011-2012 budgeted funds of \$28,000 for the project (Project Number 145 Account # 11-5-55-5940-00). Rayco has satisfactorily completed other projects.

The General Manager reported that staff are looking into a water damage claim that occurred during Casitas pipeline work. This claim will be brought forward when ready.

The General Manager also shared a letter from Scott McDonald, Utility Worker, regarding his recent attendance at the AWWA conference. The Committee suggested including the letter as information in the Board agenda.

- 4. Proposal from Flow Science regarding the Aeration System Evaluation.

 Staff has expressed the need to evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness of the lake aeration system and the need to better predict changes in lake water quality. Staff has solicited several proposals to conduct a study and develop a model that will assist staff in understanding the aeration systems role in lake water quality. One particular firm stands out as being able to scientifically analyze the lake conditions and develop and provide Casitas with a working model. The budget is \$100,000 and the proposal is \$100,000. The Committee suggested moving this item forward to the Board.
- 5. <u>Discussion regarding cattle trespass issues.</u>

The General Manager reported that the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy has taken issue of the recent cattle trespass on its lands and the lack of response to remove the cattle. The District has long had similar concerns with the same cattle owner and had expressed such concerns during the US Forest Service's consideration for issuing a grazing lease to this cattle owner. The USFS is now issuing the grazing lease on an annual basis, based on a NEPA evaluation that is more that ten years old. The Committee suggested that the General Manager prepare and send a letter to the Forest Service.

6. <u>Bid for roof replacement at Casitas No. 2 Chlorination Station.</u>

The General Manager reported that staff has received bids for this budgeted project and desire to move rapidly to the work before rainy weather occurs.

SUBJECT: Boating Cost – Revenue Analysis

Recommendation:

It is recommended this report on boating costs and revenues at Lake Casitas Recreation Area (LCRA) be received and reviewed. Further, it is recommended some boating related fee increases be considered for adoption by the Board of Directors.

Background and Overview:

Boating has been an integral part of the outdoor experience at Lake Casitas since the Lake's inception. An evolution of this recreation experience has included boat races and the removal of prohibitions on inflatables and kayaks. The early 80s saw the glory days of boating after the state record largemouth bass was caught at Casitas. This resulted in long lines of boaters, fishing tournaments with over 100 boats participating and both ramp parking lots filled to capacity on weekends. The threat of invasive species forced the closure of the Lake to all boats not stored or moored at Lake Casitas in the spring of 2008. This led to the ultimate adoption of the current boating restrictions and tamper-proof tag program.

Boating has been viewed as a supporting activity of the overall recreational opportunities available at LCRA and not as a profit center itself. It is important to note even without approved boating on Lake Casitas, reservoir surveillance would still be required to prevent unauthorized access and the introduction if invasive species to the Lake.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011, approximately \$93,000 of costs associated with oversight and management of the effort against invasive species were incurred. To compensate for these anticipated increased expenditures, fees were implemented in 2008 to offset the effects of boat inspections and the cable and lock systems. In September 2008, day use boat fees were increased 43% from \$7 to \$10 and annual boat fees were increased from \$70 to \$125, an increase of 79%.

The boating restrictions caused an overall 80% reduction in boating numbers from 2007 to 2010. The sale of annual boat decals decreased from 802 in 2007, the last year without the boating restrictions, to 608 in 2010, a decrease of 24%. All vessels moored in the slips and kept in dry storage are required to have annual passes. Individual day boat use revenue for 2010/11 was \$14,444 and the purchase of annual boat permits totaled \$64,613. The purchase of day and annual vehicle permits accompanying (towing) the vessels is estimated at \$18,825 and \$59,800 respectively.

Actual costs related to the quagga program and patrol boat operations have been tracked through the District's payroll and accounting system since 2008. This is the first time those expenses have been compared to the revenue generated from the fee increases. General personnel expenses for day to day boating have been conservatively estimated.

Fees are charged for boat inspections, re-inspections and the cable and lock system. There is no charge for the tamper-proof tags, which are applied after the initial inspection and for re-entry purposes. Expenditures for cable and lock systems, tamper-proof tags and printing for survey and boat inspection forms, and educational handouts totaled \$11,805 for the fiscal year ending 2011. The cost to operate two patrol boats, both of which were funded through Department of Boating and Waterways Boating and Enforcement grants, totaled \$13,660 for the fiscal year 2010/11, including depreciation costs for the Cortez patrol boat.

Personnel expenses related to boating restrictions and the battle against invasive species include \$68,276 for labor including re-tagging, boat and land patrol, and employee and customer education efforts. Non-quagga related annual personnel expenses related to boating are estimated at 1/8 time for an Associate Park Services Officer are \$4,040 and 1/8 time for a Park Services Officer are \$7,496. Employee benefits are estimated to be \$11,498 and administrative overhead of \$44,459 brings total employee costs related to boating to \$135,769.

Casitas supplements the now ceased California Department of Fish Game (DFG) trout plants with fish stocking and habitat improvements. This expenditure has averaged \$42,700 annually over the last five years with \$30,000 budgeted in the current fiscal year. An estimate of 50% of the annual expenditure for fish related enhancements equaling \$21,350 can be viewed as a benefit to boaters.

Although boaters could be expected to have a positive benefit to other ancillary services such as Casitas' storage, the boat rental concession, snack bar and park store, those benefits are not included for this report.

From the above information and accompanying chart (Attachment 1), this study indicates of \$182,584 in costs associated with boating, there was corresponding revenue associated with boating of \$173,498, resulting in a deficit of \$9,086 in the program.

Proposed Fee Increases:

Approximately once a year a fee survey (Attachment 2), is conducted with other recreation areas in the region to determine the suitability with LCRA fees. Fees provide for quality levels of services for the visiting public while protecting the water supply and preventing the introduction of invasive species. Ultimately, the goal is for LCRA to be financially self-sufficient. The survey indicates most LCRA fees are higher than those surveyed. In order to bridge the gap between boating expenses and revenue, minor increases in some boating fees were taken to the Recreation Committee on October 3, 2011 for discussion. A recommendation for some increases was approved for Board consideration. It was recommenced the day use and overnight kayak fees not be adjusted as the small number of users of that fee in the past now purchase annual decals due to the boating restrictions.

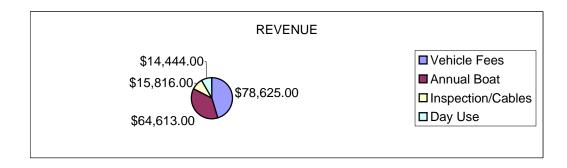

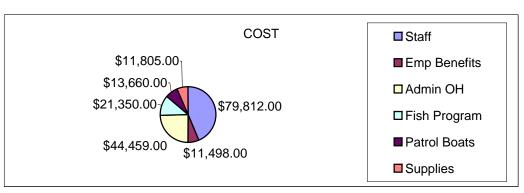

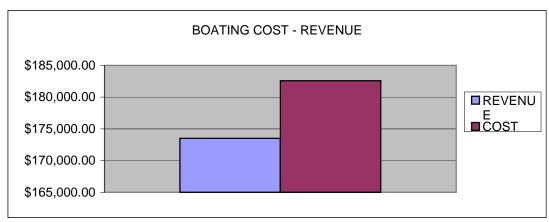

It is recommended that the Board of Directors approve the purchase order for Consolidated Electrical Distributors in the amount of \$131,033.76 for the purchase of electrical motor control centers and associated electrical equipment for the Fairview pump plant electrical upgrade project.

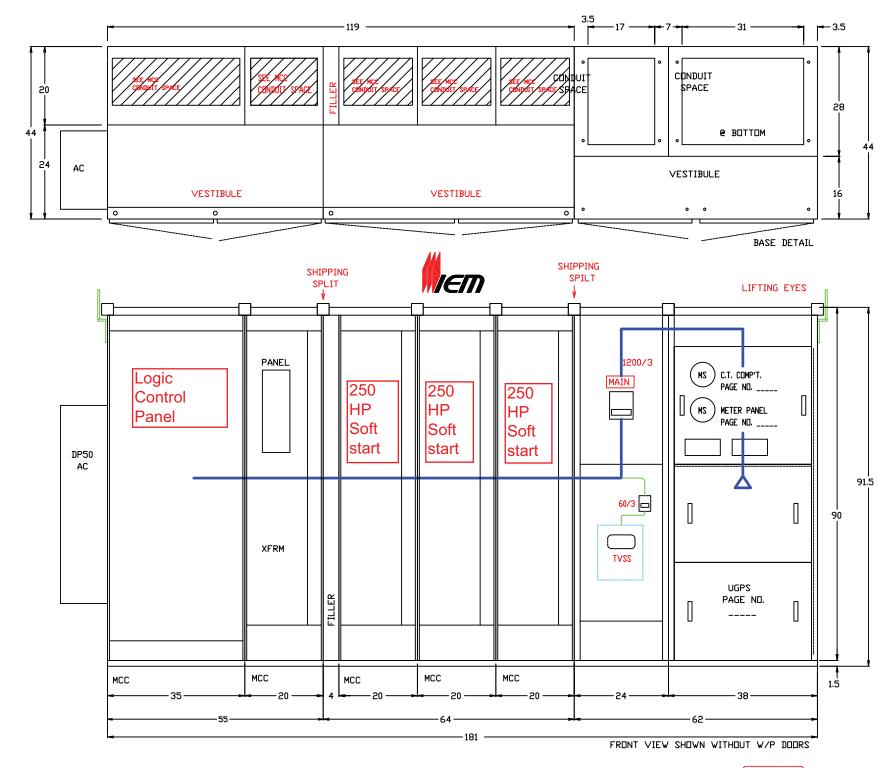
BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

The FY 2011/12 budget contains funds in the amount of \$410,000.00 for the purchase, delivery, and installation of the pump/motor control centers and associated equipment for the Fairview pump plant electrical upgrade project.

In January 2009 the Board of Directors approved expenditures for an engineering consultant to perform a pump plant-by-pump plant evaluation of seven pumping facilities. The evaluation identified and estimated the costs to provide the necessary materials and actions to bring each plant from the Edison meter to the pump motors up to NEC and NFP 70E standards. The Fairview pump plant was identified as the third most critical facility in need of upgrading based on the urgency of electrical safety hazard repairs.

To date, two pump plants were competitively bid with Allen Bradley motor control centers selected in both cases. Motor control centers require both spare parts and specialized employee training. Motor control centers are expensive with an individual unit running from approximately \$50,000 to upwards of \$250,000 depending on the size of the pump motor. Each pump plant requires multiple motor control centers. Allen Bradley motor control centers have worked well with minimal problems.

Allen Bradley sells their equipment through distributors that have exclusive territories. Consolidated Electric Distributors (CED) of Ventura is the local Allen Bradley Distributor. Staff recommends that the motor control centers be purchased under sole source designation from Allen Bradley through CED. The District's current program of maintaining a supply of Allen Bradley spare parts allows for the realization of life cycle cost savings and the minimizing of Operation's expense budget requirements.

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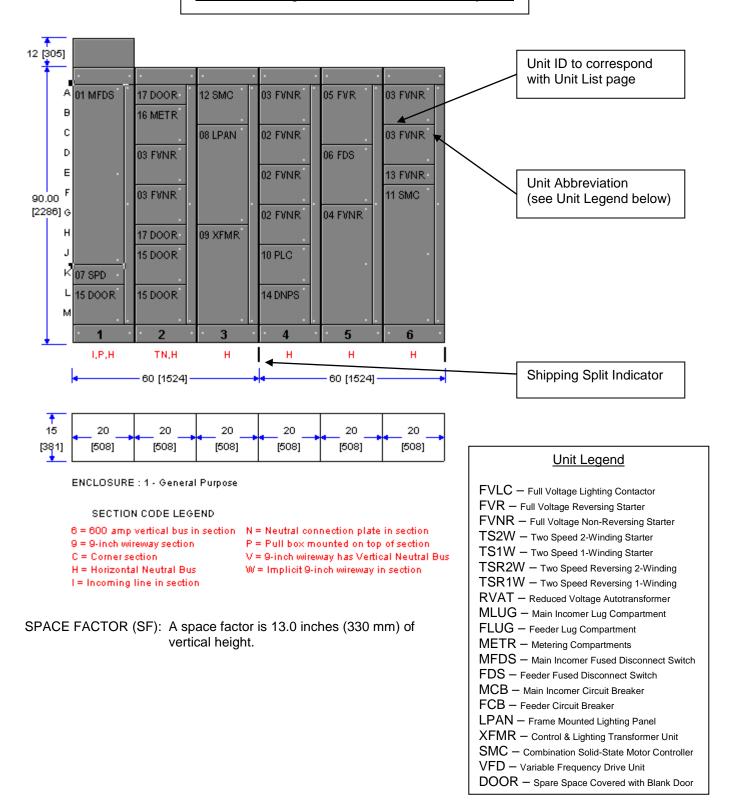

General Clarifications

- 1. Rockwell Automation has quoted the standard Allen-Bradley Bulletin 2100 MCC design with optional features in order to meet the intent of the customer specifications. Rockwell Automation has listed in this section any significant differences between the customer specifications and the quoted design; however, the customer should review this proposal to insure that the Rockwell Automation design meets the intended requirements. Clerical errors and omissions are subject to correction.
- The MCC is constructed to meet or exceed the requirements within NEMA ICS3-322, UL845, CSA, and IEC 439-1 for MCCs. The
 MCC is designed, manufactured, and tested in facilities registered to ISO 9001. It is the responsibility of the owner and/or installer to
 know and meet local codes, additional standards and OSHA requirements. All standard units are UL listed. However, some
 customized units with special modifications are not UL listed.
- 3. Proposed layouts herein may vary from those on the request for quotation due to differing sizes of units between manufacturers.
- 4. Estimated weight of the MCC is 550 pounds per section.
- 5. In-process inspection and testing by the customer's representative is not feasible under the manufacturing process inspection systems used by Rockwell Automation. Witness testing at Rockwell Automation facilities is available for \$750.00 net per day. The customer's representative will receive the services of an electrical test person. Indicate upon entry of the order if witness testing is desired.

Product Design Clarifications

Vertical Sections

- To assure structural rigidity, vertical sections have internal base mounting angles at the bottom and external lifting angles at the top running continuous within each shipping block. The mounting angles replace the need for external sills; they can be bolted or welded to the user's foundation.
- To minimize the chance of fault propagation to adjacent sections, each vertical section has side sheets extending the full height and depth of the section.
- Horizontal wireways of standard sections, both top and bottom, are 6" (150mm) high. To prevent damage to cable insulation, the wireway opening between sections have rounded corners and the edges are rolled back.

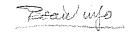

Re: 2011 AWWA Annual Fall Conference

The classes I attended covered aspects in AMR, AMI, meter typing, oscillation meters, mag meters, self-cleaning automatic screen filters, customer information systems, proper use of colorimeter, total organic carbon, disinfection by-products, chloramines, power management and conservation, major water treatment plant rehabilitation projects, advantages of working for a small utility, and a very inspirational talk on how a general manager and operations manager shaped their careers.

AMR and AMI classes covered benefits of AMI over AMR. It was encouraging to learn that AMR is the most cost effective system for reliable timely meter reading, and there are benefits to a slow install, *i.e.*, TLC used as needed with customers. Manual reads as well as AMR to work out bugs or paperwork issues. Battery replacements will come gradually. Major cost savings to our utility due to in-house AMR installation. Our AMR system is AMI compatible so remote shut-offs, on-demand reads, trends, tier cost for customers, meter reading costs, vehicle costs, and increased cash flow are capable in our near future.

Meter typing saved one company \$131,000 per year in water costs. Oscillation and mag meters provide more accurate reads with less service and a longer life.

Sacramento water treatment plant water rehabilitation project from 160 MGD to 320 MGD was interesting. Power point presentation of all phases of build-outs and rehabilitation stages from 1920, 1930, 2003 to 2012.

The most inspiring part of the conference for me was the career shaping talks as well as the advantages of working for small utilities. Water techs in small agencies juggle many tasks which train to lead and manage. These operators learn to be calm under pressure. There is a great need for local knowledge. Forward momentum in the company is possible due to developing great working relations in all departments.

Overall, I left the conference with a greater knowledge of AMR, AMI, and learned a lot in many other areas. I came back to work excited about my new career and happy to be a part of Casitas Municipal Water District.

Thursday, October 27, 2011

The water ownership situation in the cities of Felton and Ojai was sadly misrepresented by Golden State's Joe Conner and Patrick Scanlon. We in Felton pay much less for water than we would have if CalAm still owned our system, the bond cost worked out to be more than 10 percent cheaper annually than we told people during the campaign (\$535 vs. \$600), and most residents are very happy with public ownership of the system, managed by our local, accessible, efficient - and elected - public board.

Who knows what rates would be now with the private company. When they left, their service charge was \$59 to the water district's \$32, a unit of water cost \$3.89 to the water district's \$1.75, and we paid three different surcharges on top to the water district's zero.

As we finished saying goodbye to them, they had already filed with the Public Utilities Commission to raise rates even further: \$67 bimonthly meter and \$4.56 - \$7.60 for a unit of water! Golden State will do everything they can to sow fear, uncertainty and doubt. Don't be fooled.

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Eye on the environment: Ventura watershed vulnerable to invasive species

Our local watershed and ecosystem are vulnerable to the impacts of invasive species. The good news is that everyone can play a role in preventing or slowing the spread of invasive species, which is the best way to stop the ecological impacts they cause. Because once an invasive species is introduced, eradication is usually not possible.

Western Ventura County depends completely on local water supplies, because no water is imported from the outside. Any impacts to our local water supply can have devastating effects on native plants and animals, farmers, businesses and residents.

The most important way to fight invasive species is to be vigilant when there is a potential to personally introduce them to a home, neighborhood or local watershed. It is relatively easy to pick up an innocent-looking, beautiful plant at a nursery, only to later become alarmed after it quickly spreads and replaces the native plants in our landscape. That is just the beginning, because an invasive plant can wreak havoc on an entire ecosystem.

For example, suppose you decide to pick up a tropical grass called Golden Chain because it will compliment your home design. Golden Chain also is known as Arundo donax, an invasive species that has had a significant impact on the Ventura River watershed because it has blocked large portions of the river to fish passage, generated large amounts of debris during storms and soaked up large amounts of water.

Once such an invasive species is introduced into a watershed, it must be managed in perpetuity to control it. It is important that we become educated about the plants we purchase so we can prevent further introductions of Arundo and other invasive plants.

Another way for invasive species to be introduced is through fish bait. Some crayfish used as bait are invasive, and some invasive larvae such as Quagga mussel could be mixed in with fish bait that could then easily enter the local water supply.

If Quagga mussels are introduced into Lake Casitas, there likely would be significant impacts to the ecosystem and the Casitas Municipal Water District's water treatment processes, which could lead to dramatic increases in the cost of treating water. This could result in much higher water bills for agricultural, business and residential customers.

This is why the Lake Casitas Recreation Area has a strict boat inspection program to ensure Quagga mussels do not enter.

Another invasive species already has proliferated in Lake Casitas, the common carp. Lake Casitas approved bowfishing for carp this year to help control the population. The carp hunting season will last until May 15.

Common carp harm the ecosystem by stirring up the lake bottom, which discourages light from reaching aquatic plants favored by birds, game fish and other wildlife. They are prodigious breeders that spawn three times a year. They have few natural predators and are difficult to catch with traditional fishing methods. Casitas joins Big Bear and Cachuma lakes in allowing bowfishing for carp.

Keep an eye on the environment by being aware of the plants you place in your landscape and the bait you use for fishing. And don't forget to get out to Lake Casitas and try some bowfishing to help thin the carp population. It is important we stay vigilant in protecting our local water supply because it supports our environment, economy and the people who live here.
