Minutes of the Casitas Municipal Water District Board Meeting Held January 8, 2014

A meeting of the Board of Directors was held January 8, 2014 at Casitas' Office, Oak View, California. Directors Word, Hicks, Bergen, Kaiser and Baggerly were present. Also present were Steve Wickstrum, General Manager, Rebekah Vieira, Clerk of the Board, and Attorney, John Mathews. There were three staff members and five members of the public in attendance. President Word led the group in the flag salute.

2. General Manager comments.

Mr. Wickstrum reported on a meeting with a Bureau of Reclamation representative out of Sacramento and discussion on the Safety of Dams. The representative reviewed the completed work and the scouring that occurred. A subsequent conversation was that the Bureau would approach the slides that occurred 13 years ago as a SOD issue if it got beyond the surface rock. We would like to bring a draft letter and agreement to the board at the next meeting to request the Bureau move ahead with their process. There will be some cost adjustments because of the work on the stability berm toe. Director Bergen asked if the slide information will be in writing. Mr. Wickstrum replied it will be in writing and in the comprehensive facility reviews.

Mr. Wickstrum then reported that he and Mr. Merckling will meet with the City of Ventura on Monday. Mr. Merckling is working on a press release regarding drought and where we stand with Lake Casitas. Villanova reservoir project is proceeding. This project has caused some stress to the system and we are operating some of our pumps manually. We will try to arrange a time for board members to see the project when it is safer.

7. Update on Casitas Action as a result of Quagga Mussels at Lake Piru.

Mr. Wickstrum discussed the finding of quagga mussels at Lake Piru. Staff has been in communication with Lake Piru and on December 20th I took emergency action to extend the ten day quarantine to 28 days given the research that states the quagga mussel can sustain life for 27 days in cool climate. We may be bringing some recommendations to the board at a later date. What we

are operating under right now is the strictest in the state. We will continue to communicate with United Water Conservation District and continue to safeguard our reservoir as much as we humanly can.

Director Baggerly passed out some thoughts he had and suggested that the quagga threat is even closer and we need to strengthen our defenses. We need to protect ourselves from watercraft that may be infected with quagga mussels. After discussion on various recommendations the board suggested creation of an ad hoc committee to review the program.

Mr. Wickstrum explained that there has been a lot of consideration and work on what to do given the issues these last months on part time employment, health insurance requirements, limits to temporary staff and how do we work there to keep staffing levels appropriate. Additionally, the last year and a half we have staffed the recreation area on a 24/7 basis to safeguard the lake. The recommended changes include using full time positions in lieu of part time.

President Hicks asked about the current number of full time employees and that about ten years ago we had 42 full time employees. Mr. Wickstrum added that 30 years ago we had close to 70 full time employees. We have brought on a lot of additional things such as the fish ladder, water conservation and safety. Director Bergen added that in reviewing the financials and budgets of the district the biggest changes have been in water conservation and fisheries. It will be a benefit to have full time personnel with areas of responsibilities. Things have changed enough that having full time personnel can be important.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors approve a purchase order for Consolidated Electrical Distributors in the not to exceed amount of \$205,977.36 for the purchase of electrical motor control centers and associated electrical equipment for the Upper Ojai 3M Pump Plant electrical upgrade project.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

The FY 2013/14 budget contains funds in the amount of \$314,000.00 for the purchase, delivery, and installation of the pump/motor control centers and associated equipment for the Ojai Valley Pump Plant electrical upgrade project.

In January 2009 the Board of Directors approved expenditures for an engineering consultant to perform a pump plant-by-pump plant evaluation of seven pumping facilities. The evaluation identified and estimated the costs to provide the necessary materials and actions to bring each plant from the Edison meter to the pump motors up to NEC and NFP 70E standards. The Upper Ojai 3M pump plant was identified as the fifth facility in need of upgrading based on the urgency of electrical safety hazard repairs.

To date, two pump plants were competitively bid with Allen Bradley motor control centers selected in both cases. Motor control centers require both spare parts and specialized employee training. Motor control centers are expensive with an individual unit running from approximately \$50,000 to upwards of \$250,000 depending on the size of the pump motor. Each pump plant requires multiple motor control centers. Allen Bradley motor control centers have worked well with minimal problems.

Allen Bradley sells their equipment through distributors that have exclusive territories. Consolidated Electric Distributors (CED) of Ventura is the local Allen Bradley distributor.

Staff recommends that the motor control centers be purchased under sole source designation from Allen Bradley through CED. The District's current program of maintaining a supply of Allen Bradley spare parts allows for the realization of life cycle cost savings and the minimizing of Operation's expense budget requirements.

The purchase order's total amount includes an estimated additional sum of \$1,300.00 for CED to provide shipping FOB job site.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors adopt a resolution accepting the proposal submitted by the lowest responsible bidder and award the contract for the Lake Casitas Recreation Area Roads Maintenance project, Specification 13-368 to J & H Engineering General Contractors, Inc. of Camarillo in the amount of \$165,836.00. It is further recommended that the President of the Board execute the agreement for said work and the Board authorize staff to proceed with the administration of the contract.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

The project involves the removing and replacing of areas of existing deteriorated pavement for portions of the Main Access Road, replacing damaged pavement and subgrade at Santa Ana Ramp No. 2, applying a Cape Seal to Campground B access roads and removing damaged pavement at the alternate entrance from HWY-150 and replacing it with (PMB) Processed Miscellaneous Base.

The project was advertised through F.W. Dodge and on the District's web site. Four bidders (out of 6) completed the non-mandatory job walk. Five firms submitted proposals. The proposal results are:

J & H Engineering General Contractors has successfully completed several similar projects for the District. J & H Engineering General Contractors Inc. contractor's license is current and active.

The Engineer's estimate to complete the LCRA Roads Maintenance project was \$200,000.00. The FY 2013-14 Budget allocated \$200,000.00 for the completion of this project. The cost for the LCRA Roads Maintenance project is under budget. Some of the construction cost may be eligible for funding from the United States Bureau of Reclamation.

This project is Categorically Exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act under Section 15301 Existing Facilities.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors review and approve the form and content of the Contract and direct the General Manager to forward the Contract to the Bureau of Reclamation with the cover letter.

BACKGROUND:

Over the course of the past four years the District and the Bureau of Reclamation have been negotiating a contract for the repayment of the District's obligation for the safety of dam work performed on Casitas Dam. A copy of the final draft of the contract is attached to this memorandum.

While Casitas and the Bureau believe that they arrived at a final contract in April 2013, the District and Bureau have only recently progressed on two specific items concerning the condition of the Dam transfer. The first item was the repair of a poorly constructed drainage channel where the base of the stability dam contacted the original material. In November 2013, the Bureau returned to the site and made the repairs to the drainage channel. The cost of the repair work is understood to be added to the total cost for the SOD contract, and the District is responsible for fifteen percent of the cost. The second item concerns the condition of the slope protection rock on the dam's downstream face and the superficial slide channels that can be seen on the dam. The District has contended since year 2000 that the District should not be required under its maintenance obligation to repair the slides. In a recent conversation with Mr. Todd Hill, USBR Safety of Dams, it was recognized that the present condition does not pose a dam safety issue and that if conditions did change to a safety condition the Bureau would consider actions under the Safety of Dams Act. For now and into the future, the Comprehensive Facility Review for Casitas Dam requires the District is to monitor the areas.

At this time, the Bureau would like to receive a letter from the district that states that the District agrees that we have negotiated the attached contract, request the Bureau to proceed with the actions necessary to public post the contract, get Bureau signatures, and return the contract to the District for execution. The District will at a later date also have to proceed through a validation process for the completion of the contract.

Dear Michael,

On January 8, 2014, I met with Mr. Todd Hill, Project Manager, Bureau of Reclamation Safety of Dams, to overview the work completed on the drainage at the stability berm and to reach a common conclusion on the condition of the slope protection rock on the downstream face of Casitas Dam. It appears that Mr. Hill was satisfied with the Bureau's repair of the drainage channel, and it is understood by Casitas and the Bureau that this repair project is a part of the current Safety of Dams work and will be accounted for in the cost statement in the Repayment Contract.

Our discussion regarding the slope protection on the downstream face of Casitas Dam is summarized as Casitas will continue to monitor the areas and no further recommendation will be made during the comprehensive facilities review, but should there be an exposure of the underlying zone material there will be a consideration of implementing a new Safety of Dams review and project by the Bureau. As stated before, we all hope that the slope protection will remain intact and no exposure of the underlying zones would occur. But should this condition occur, the Bureau would consider addressing this as a dam safety issue, rather than a maintenance issue. It seems from my discussion with Mr. Hill that this is the direction the Bureau will follow in the future.

With the above having been said and understood, I am requesting that we finalize and execute the contract in the form provided as Version 04122013.doc as negotiated between the United States and Casitas for the Safety of Dams Act modifications at Casitas Dam. Please make the appropriate adjustments to the cost summary, post for 60-day public notice, and proceed with all other necessary steps to complete this action.

Your attention to the final details of this project and contract is greatly appreciated. Please call me to discuss how we can complete this job without further delay.

This Contract shall not be binding on the United States until such final decree has been secured.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND:

In April 2008, the District implemented the Quagga Mussel Prevention Program to protect Lake Casitas from the transport of quagga mussel by boats that may have been in infested water from entering into Lake Casitas. On December 20, 2013, the District was notified that quagga mussels had been identified at Lake Piru. The initial emergency action taken by the General Manager was change to the Program was to increase the length of the quarantine period from 10 days to 28 days. Further, on January 8th, 2014, an ad hoc committee was formed to work specifically on the quagga mussel prevent issue.

UPDATE:

The ad hoc committee met on January 14th to review strategies to continue and fortify the protective efforts being conducted at the Lake Casitas Recreation Area. The following topics were discussed during the meeting:

- > Staff are in the process of updating the quagga policy and will bring this policy to the Board for their concurrence.
- Review of tagging system and investigation into other tracking systems the current tagtracking system has been modernized. Staff emphasized that all inspected boats are considered to have been in infected waters until otherwise passing Casitas' clean and dry inspection process, followed by a quarantine period.
- ➤ Staff recommended extending the quarantine period to 35 days and lessening the period between a failed inspection and re-inspection to 7 days. The General Manager issued a revised memorandum to staff on January 14th to adjust their procedures to this schedule.
- ➤ Staff will arrange a schedule for water quality monitoring plankton tows and analysis are to be conducted monthly and substrate monitoring (via underwater inspections) shall be done bi-monthly. Staff will record the information on a central data sheet. The Lab is obtaining preserved samples of quagga veligers from a qualified lab, so Casitas' lab can calibrate the microscope to be used to identify contents of the plankton tow.
- The ad hoc committee will meet bi-weekly. Additional task to consider any legislation efforts that are needed, continued communication with Lake Piru, and coordination with regulatory agencies.

United Water Conservation District is coordinating with the regulatory agencies, reasoning through their requirements to release water from Santa Felicia Dam for downstream habitat, and potential issues with releasing water that contains quagga veligers. They plan to assess the level of infestation next week with divers combing the Lake Piru bottom.

Re: Drought Proclamation by Governor Brown – State of California

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors discuss and provide direction to staff.

BACKGROUND:

On January 15, 2014, the United States Department of Agriculture sent a letter to Governor Brown that designated specific California counties as primary natural disaster areas due to the recent drought. Ventura County is one of those counties. This declaration made farmers in these counties eligible to apply for emergency loans. The local Farm Service Agency can provide affected farmers with further information.

On January 16, 2014, Eric Boldt of NOAA Weather Service spoke before the Association of Water Agencies of Ventura County on the topic of the current drought conditions. Bottom line – there is no rain in sight for the remainder of this year. The southwestern United States may be under the influence of a 20 to 30 year drought cycle of which we have already experienced since 1998.

On January 17, 2014, Governor Brown declared a drought state of emergency for California. With extremely low snow pack conditions in the northern Sierras, diminished storage in most State Water reservoirs, it appears that water supplies of the State are under stress and only going to be more stressed as California heads to the summer months.

A copy of the posted proclamation of a state of emergency is attached to this memorandum. The signed copy of the Proclamation was not available at the time of this memorandum.

ASSESSMENT:

The Proclamation by Governor Brown calls for certain actions to be conducted by State and local water agencies. The following is an assessment of the Proclamation actions that will affect the Casitas Municipal Water District:

#1 - Campaign to call upon Californians to reduce their water usage by 20 percent.

This is a continuation of the 20 percent by 2020 campaign issued by the Governor in 2012. The District has continued to provide information that is in compliance with this campaign.

#2 – Local urban water suppliers and municipalities are called upon to implement their local water shortage contingency plans immediately....update their legally required urban and agricultural water management plans.

The District is operating under the water shortage contingency plan that was develop in

1992 (Ordinance No. 92-7), Water Waste Regulations (Resolution No. 08-09), and revisions that were incorporated into the District's Urban Water Management Plan. At the Stage 1 condition of Lake Casitas (volume greater than 50%) the District has implemented a voluntary water conservation requirement for its customers. Since 1992, the District has been on an active campaign to bring water conservation as a way of life and a way to sustain our local water resources. During the last decade, the district has increased its water conservation outreach to achieve the goals of water supply sustainability as a way of life in the district.

The district is currently updating the 1992 water shortage contingency plan and will likely be ready for public discussion in March 2014.

#4 – The Department of Water resources and the State Water resources Control Board will expedite the processing of water transfers, as called for in Executive Order B-21-13....to flow where it is needed most.

This may influence the use of any available State Water and have no direct impact on this District – we do not receive State Water. The State Water availability is now set at 5 percent, an all-time low condition. The District and City of Ventura have already committed their 2014 entitlements to the Multi-year Pool, which is an accepted form of water transfer that is implemented by the State.

At this present time, Lake Casitas is at still at Stage 1 condition with approximately 60% of full capacity. Meanwhile, the Ventura River groundwater is severely depleted and groundwater pumpers in all locations are temporarily transferring their water demands over to the Lake Casitas supply. With the current trends in weather and water demand, it is highly likely that Lake Casitas will decline to 50 percent capacity by September 2014. With the FY 2012-13 water sales from Lake Casitas approaching just over 16,000 acre-feet, it is likely that the District may see water sales increase to very near the safe yield number of 20,000 acre-feet due to the additional temporary transfer of demand from groundwater pumpers. It can be expected that at Stage 2 conditions the Board of Directors will consider the implementation of additional restrictions on water use.

Staff has been directed to complete the revisions to the Water Efficiency and Allocation Program in a timely manner, making this Program the highest of priorities for the district at this time. Staff will continue to ramp up efforts in the water conservation and education programs, all of which will also be reflected in the budget planning for FY 2014-15.

Governor Brown Declares Drought State of Emergency

Calls for Conservation Statewide, Directs State to Manage Water for Drought

SAN FRANCISCO – With California facing water shortfalls in the driest year in recorded state history, Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. today proclaimed a State of Emergency and directed state officials to take all necessary actions to prepare for these drought conditions.

"We can't make it rain, but we can be much better prepared for the terrible consequences that California's drought now threatens, including dramatically less water for our farms and communities and increased fires in both urban and rural areas," said Governor Brown. "I've declared this emergency and I'm calling all Californians to conserve water in every way possible."

In the State of Emergency declaration, Governor Brown directed state officials to assist farmers and communities that are economically impacted by dry conditions and to ensure the state can respond if Californians face drinking water shortages. The Governor also directed state agencies to use less water and hire more firefighters and initiated a greatly expanded water conservation public awareness campaign (details at saveourh2o.org).

In addition, the proclamation gives state water officials more flexibility to manage supply throughout California under drought conditions.

State water officials say that California's river and <u>reservoirs</u> are below their record lows. Manual and electronic readings record the snowpack's statewide water content at about 20 percent of normal average for this time of year.

The Governor's drought State of Emergency follows a series of actions the administration has taken to ensure that California is prepared for record dry conditions. In May 2013, Governor Brown issued an <u>Executive Order</u> to direct state water officials to expedite the review and processing of voluntary transfers of water and water rights. In December, the Governor formed a <u>Drought Task Force</u> to review expected water allocations, California's preparedness for water scarcity and whether conditions merit a drought declaration. Earlier this week, the Governor toured the Central Valley and spoke with growers and others impacted by California's record dry conditions.

The full text of the emergency proclamation is below:

A PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS the State of California is experiencing record dry conditions, with 2014 projected to become the driest year on record; and

WHEREAS the state's water supplies have dipped to alarming levels, indicated by: snowpack in California's mountains is approximately 20 percent of the normal average for this date; California's largest water reservoirs have very low water levels for this time of year; California's major river systems, including the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers, have significantly reduced surface water flows; and groundwater levels throughout the state have dropped significantly; and

WHEREAS dry conditions and lack of precipitation present urgent problems: drinking water supplies are at risk in many California communities; fewer crops can be cultivated and farmers' long-term investments are put at risk; low-income communities heavily dependent on agricultural employment will suffer heightened unemployment and economic hardship; animals and plants that rely on California's rivers, including many species in danger of extinction, will be threatened; and the risk of wildfires across the state is greatly increased; and

WHEREAS extremely dry conditions have persisted since 2012 and may continue beyond this year and more regularly into the future, based on scientific projections regarding the impact of climate change on California's snowpack; and

WHEREAS the magnitude of the severe drought conditions presents threats beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment and facilities of any single local government and require the combined forces of a mutual aid region or regions to combat; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of section 8558(b) of the California Government Code, I find that conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property exist in California due to water shortage and drought conditions with which local authority is unable to cope.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, EDMUND G. BROWN JR., Governor of the State of California, in accordance with the authority vested in me by the state Constitution and statutes, including the California Emergency Services Act, and in particular, section 8625 of the California Government Code HEREBY PROCLAIM A STATE OF EMERGENCY to exist in the State of California due to current drought conditions.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

- 1.State agencies, led by the Department of Water Resources, will execute a statewide water conservation campaign to make all Californians aware of the drought and encourage personal actions to reduce water usage. This campaign will be built on the existing Save Our Water campaign (www.saveourh20.org) and will coordinate with local water agencies. This campaign will call on Californians to reduce their water usage by 20 percent.
- 2.Local urban water suppliers and municipalities are called upon to implement their local water shortage

contingency plans immediately in order to avoid or forestall outright restrictions that could become necessary later in the drought season. Local water agencies should also update their legally required urban and agricultural water management plans, which help plan for extended drought conditions. The Department of Water Resources will make the status of these updates publicly available.

- 3.State agencies, led by the Department of General Services, will immediately implement water use reduction plans for all state facilities. These plans will include immediate water conservation actions, and a moratorium will be placed on new, non-essential landscaping projects at state facilities and on state highways and roads.
- 4.The Department of Water Resources and the State Water Resources Control Board (Water Board) will expedite the processing of water transfers, as called for in Executive Order B-21-13. Voluntary water transfers from one water right holder to another enables water to flow where it is needed most.
- 5.The Water Board will immediately consider petitions requesting consolidation of the places of use of the State Water Project and Federal Central Valley Project, which would streamline water transfers and exchanges between water users within the areas of these two major water projects.
- 6.The Department of Water Resources and the Water Board will accelerate funding for water supply enhancement projects that can break ground this year and will explore if any existing unspent funds can be repurposed to enable near-term water conservation projects.
- 7. The Water Board will put water right holders throughout the state on notice that they may be directed to cease or reduce water diversions based on water shortages.
- 8.The Water Board will consider modifying requirements for reservoir releases or diversion limitations, where existing requirements were established to implement a water quality control plan. These changes would enable water to be conserved upstream later in the year to protect cold water pools for salmon and steelhead, maintain water supply, and improve water quality.
- 9.The Department of Water Resources and the Water Board will take actions necessary to make water immediately available, and, for purposes of carrying out directives 5 and 8, Water Code section 13247 and Division 13 (commencing with section 21000) of the Public Resources Code and regulations adopted pursuant to that Division are suspended on the basis that strict compliance with them will prevent, hinder, or delay the mitigation of the effects of the emergency. Department of Water Resources and the Water Board shall maintain on their websites a list of the activities or approvals for which these provisions are suspended.
- 10. The state's Drinking Water Program will work with local agencies to identify communities that may run out of drinking water, and will provide technical and financial assistance to help these communities address drinking water shortages. It will also identify emergency interconnections that exist among the state's public water systems that can help these threatened communities.
- 11. The Department of Water Resources will evaluate changing groundwater levels, land subsidence, and agricultural land fallowing as the drought persists and will provide a public update by April 30 that identifies groundwater basins with water shortages and details gaps in groundwater monitoring.
- 12. The Department of Water Resources will work with counties to help ensure that well drillers submit

required groundwater well logs for newly constructed and deepened wells in a timely manner and the Office of Emergency Services will work with local authorities to enable early notice of areas experiencing problems with residential groundwater sources.

- 13.The California Department of Food and Agriculture will launch a one-stop website (www.cdfa.ca.gov/drought) that provides timely updates on the drought and connects farmers to state and federal programs that they can access during the drought.
- 14. The Department of Fish and Wildlife will evaluate and manage the changing impacts of drought on threatened and endangered species and species of special concern, and develop contingency plans for state Wildlife Areas and Ecological Reserves to manage reduced water resources in the public interest.
- 15. The Department of Fish and Wildlife will work with the Fish and Game Commission, using the best available science, to determine whether restricting fishing in certain areas will become necessary and prudent as drought conditions persist.
- 16. The Department of Water Resources will take necessary actions to protect water quality and water supply in the Delta, including installation of temporary barriers or temporary water supply connections as needed, and will coordinate with the Department of Fish and Wildlife to minimize impacts to affected aquatic species.
- 17. The Department of Water Resources will refine its seasonal climate forecasting and drought prediction by advancing new methodologies piloted in 2013.
- 18. The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection will hire additional seasonal firefighters to suppress wildfires and take other needed actions to protect public safety during this time of elevated fire risk.
- 19. The state's Drought Task Force will immediately develop a plan that can be executed as needed to provide emergency food supplies, financial assistance, and unemployment services in communities that suffer high levels of unemployment from the drought.
- 20. The Drought Task Force will monitor drought impacts on a daily basis and will advise me of subsequent actions that should be taken if drought conditions worsen.
- **I FURTHER DIRECT** that as soon as hereafter possible, this Proclamation be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given of this Proclamation.

A Secretarial disaster designation makes farm operators in primary counties and those counties contiguous to such primary counties eligible to be considered for certain assistance from the Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. This assistance includes FSA emergency loans. Farmers in eligible counties have 8 months from the date of a Secretarial disaster declaration to apply for emergency loans. FSA considers each emergency loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of production losses on the farm, and the security and repayment ability of the operator.



SUBJECT: FEES TO COVER \$50 MILLION WATER TREATMENT FACILITY

UPGRADE ASSOCIATED WITH BODY CONTACT AT LAKE CASITAS

Board Members:

On December 26, 2013 the Ventura County Star published an article regarding the possibility of allowing body contact at Lake Casitas through increased recreational use of the lake. It was very thought-provoking. What caught my interest was Mr. Merckling's statement that:

"...it would cost the water district \$50 million to give the water treatment plant the capability to handle biological agents introduced to the water through body contact, which could handle pathogens such as E. coli and cryptosporidium."

Mr. Merckling's apparent concern about cost reflects great prudence. In that regard, I am including information and thoughts for your consideration, which should clarify the options available to your Board regarding charging farmers and other current water customers for the plant upgrade to deal with the impacts on water quality of body contact at the lake. As you are well aware, the people of California approved Proposition 13 in 1978 to limit property taxes. The proposition included additional provisions regarding exactions and fees that could be levied by governmental agencies without a vote of the affected electorate. Those fee provisions are now Section 3 (d) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution.

Constitutional Protection to Prevent Government from Charging Excess Fees

Article XIIIA, Section 3 (d) The State bears the burden of proving by preponderance of the evidence that a levy, charge or other exaction is not a tax, that the amount is no more than necessary to cover the reasonable cost of the governmental activity, and that the manner in which these costs are allocated to a payor bear a fair or reasonable relationship to the payor's burdens on, or benefits received from, the governmental entity.

If the water treatment facility upgrade described in the Ventura County Star is required not by revisions to federal and State water law and regulation, but only by "biological agents introduced to the water through body contact" of recreational use approved by the water district, the fees to cover the \$50 million plant upgrade would have to be allocated to the recreational users of the lake, not the district's 70,000 customers. The new burden on the district would derive from recreational use of the lake, and the benefits would accrue to recreational users; fees to address the impact would have to be allocated to new recreational uses and not existing payors unless the new fees were approved by a vote of the affected individuals and entities.

I respectfully suggest that the Casitas Municipal Water District review the provisions of Section 3(d) of Article XIIIA and determine the feasibility of allocating fees in compliance with the requirements of the California Constitution.
